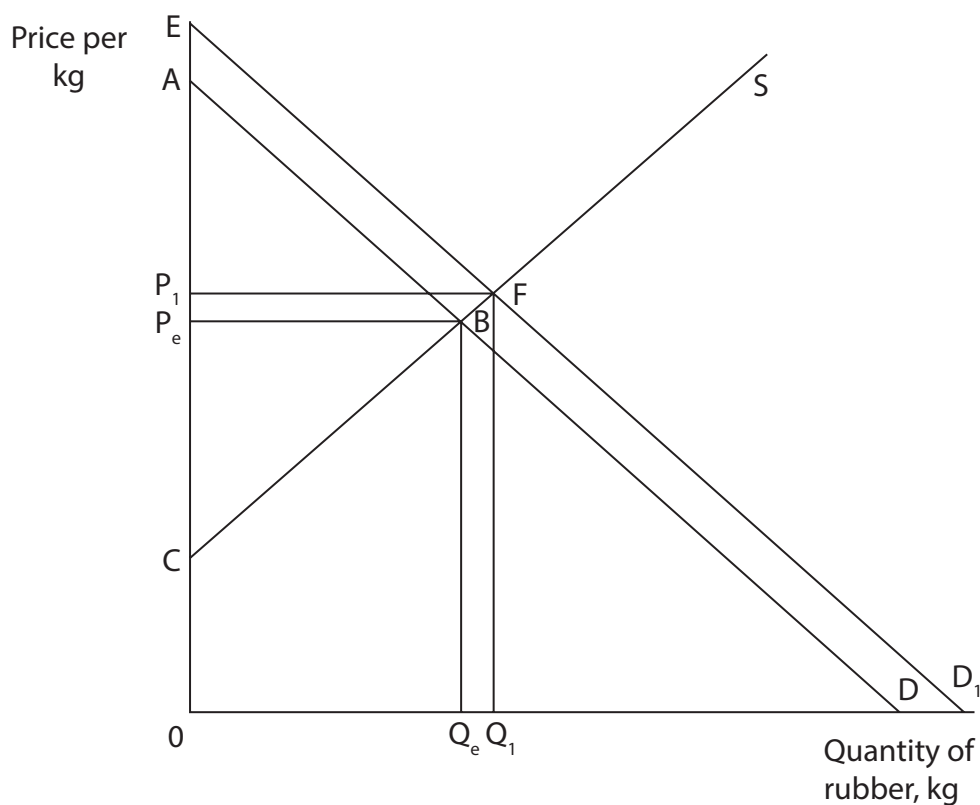

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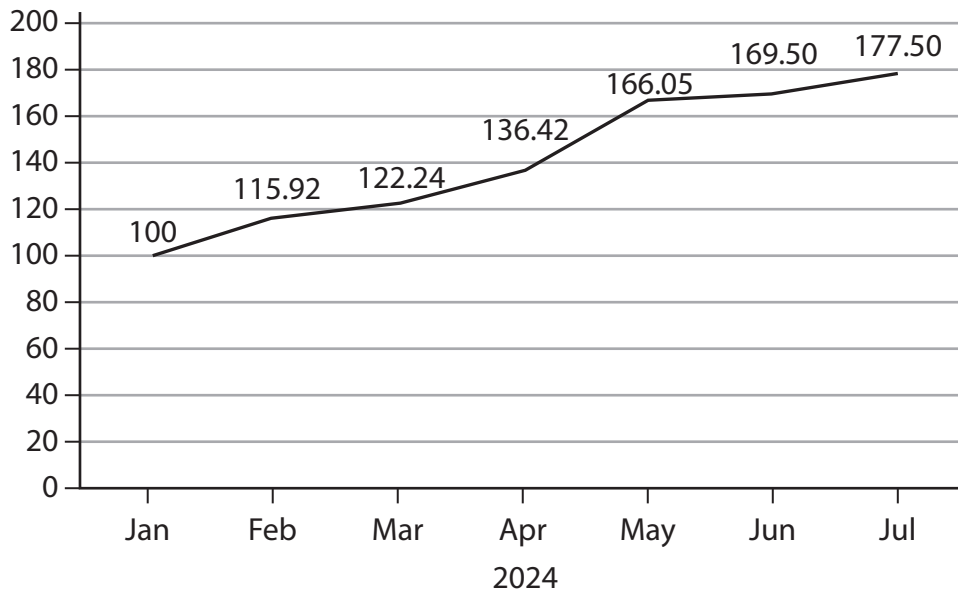

Flights, theme parks and financial support for tourism

Figure 1 Index of the average price of flights to Europe from the UK, January to July 2024, (January 2024 = 100)



Extract A European flight prices

European flight prices increased significantly between January and July 2024. A number of cost pressures led to higher flight prices.

Firstly, there was a substantial rise in the price of jet fuel in 2024. Jet fuel makes up 30% of an airline's costs.

Secondly, there was a shortage of new aircraft. Boeing and Airbus, two of the major aircraft manufacturers, had difficulty in sourcing enough parts from their suppliers. Consequently, airlines had to use older, less fuel-efficient aeroplanes that require more jet fuel.

Thirdly, there were wage increases for pilots and aircrew. For example, the minimum annual wage for a co-pilot increased from €25 000 in 2023 to €51 000 by early 2025.

Extract B Disney theme parks

Research conducted in the USA found that there are significant external benefits to the community for every \$1 billion Disney spends on improving Disneyland Park in California. These benefits include:

- the creation of 7 869 construction jobs 5
- \$1.9 billion worth of output on construction
- the creation of 3 634 jobs operating the theme park
- \$508m worth of economic output
- an extra \$87m of tax revenue.

In 2025 Disneyland Park, California also directly supported the local community by spending: 10

- \$30m on affordable housing
- \$8m for park improvements including playgrounds and sports courts.

Consumers of Disney theme parks were found to display habitual behaviour. 83% of its consumers returned for further visits to Disney theme parks. 15

Disney has four theme parks in the city of Orlando. 72% of Orlando's electricity is generated through gas and 25.4% from coal. Disney will now be able to power two of its four theme parks from a new solar panel facility at Walt Disney World Resort. This will reduce its greenhouse gas emissions by 52 000 metric tonnes per year.

Extract C Government of Spain's support for the tourist industry

The number of tourists visiting Spain is much lower between October and June than between July and September. To support the tourism industry during the months of low demand, the Government of Spain offers a subsidy for holidays taken by Spanish citizens aged over 55. When these citizens book their holiday a payment is made by the Government to the hotel or holiday park. In 2024 the subsidy contributed to 886 269 holidays. The budget for this subsidy was €300m. This scheme is not available for foreign tourists. 5
